Refugee Aid Crisis—Fact Sheet

- In 2022, over 25,500 refugees have already entered the United States.
- Each year, around 500 refugees resettle in Jacksonville, Florida and the surrounding areas.
- Over 250 Afghan refugees resettled in Jacksonville in March 2022, and over 300 Ukrainian refugees are expected to arrive in Jacksonville throughout 2023.
- Refugees receive 90 days of resettlement aid from the U.S. government.
- This aid includes some financial help, low-cost living placement and a few other basic living necessities.
- Three months is not nearly enough time for refugees to transition from refugee camps to society, learn a new language and find stable work to support a family.
- After the 90 days, many refugees are left ill-prepared and uninformed, making adjusting to life in America even more difficult.
- Refugees are often provided with run-down, unfit housing and live in unhealthy conditions because they do not have the means to provide for their families and afford adequate housing.

- Most refugees—especially those who have recently arrived—cannot afford or do not have access to medical insurance, including dental care, general medicine and other health care.
- Not only are the area, people and culture foreign to newly arriving refugees, but also the food and ingredients that they can find in the stores.
- Many refugees struggle to provide their families with healthy, nutritious meals because they do not know how to cook with the food available to them
